

Shawnee County Republicans Local Candidate Primary Survey

1. Tell voters about yourself:

My name is Gabriel Killman, and I'm a lifelong resident of Topeka. As a local woodworker and passionate student of history, I believe deeply in preserving the American way of life and the values that have shaped our nation.
